Collector's Piece Bookbinding *with* **Helen Gibbs**

August 11th, 2018
Heene Community Centre
122 Heene Road
Worthing BN11 4PL
10am - 4pm
Cost £25 + materials

This workshop will focus mainly on one structure - the longstitch album. We will spend most of the day on this project and at the end you will have a finished book that you can keep things in such as cards, envelopes etc. The tutor will supply most of the materials but students should prepare art-worked papers for front and back covers.

Students can choose from two sizes – either a smaller, A5 portrait album, or the larger, more ambitious, A4 landscape album. If you are an absolute beginner you may want to choose the smaller version as this will be a little easier to handle - but it depends on the size of your collection! Please decide before the workshop and let Helen know as she will bring your materials cut to size. (Helen will be in touch before the workshop to ask for your preferred choice.)

Other samples of book structures used for collecting will be shown and there may be time to experiment with them.

This workshop is fully booked





The tutor will supply:

Paper for pages cut to size. Boards for covers cut to size. Strips of book cloth for the binding Templates and handouts

Students should bring:

- Ruler, pencil, masking tape
- Cutting mat and scalpel/kraft knife with new blades
- Scrap magazine paper to glue up on
- Bone folder
- A4 (or bigger) size pressing board, at least 1cm thick (bring 2 the same if you can)
- PVA glue and glue brush*
- Bookbinders sewing thread and needle*
- Pricker for making sewing holes/pin vice*
- A selection of A4 papers to play with alternative structures if there is time.
- See below for info about cover papers
- * The teacher can supply these on the day if you don't have them

NB. There will be a charge for materials on the day: £4/£3 depending on the size of book.

Students should bring 2 sheets of art-worked paper for front and back covers:

Choose paper from the 120 – 150gsm range and try to organise the grain direction of the paper to be parallel to the spine. You can decorate the papers in whichever way you like.

Sizes (choose one of these sizes)

A5 portrait album is 15 x 21 cm so each one of your covers should be 20 x 26cm to include turn ins. A4 landscape album is 29.5×21.5 so each one of your covers should be 35×27 cm including turn ins.

Embossing With Extra Pizzazz

Shadows, highlights and a third dimension.....

Embossing is the art of shaping letters and patterns so that they are raised above the surface of the surrounding paper. Embossed surfaces cast subtle shadows, giving an appearance of quality wherever used. You will learn to prepare and cut templates which can be re-used, along with the embossing process, with its many and varied applications.

With a little more cutting for 3D 'build-ups' and some exciting multiple embossing, perhaps even a touch of colour, you can really give it that extra pzazz!

Come and enjoy these two, easily acquired, related techniques, to produce some stunning results.

Materials To Bring:

- Embossing tool (two size, double ended are excellent)
- Cutting Mat
- Exacto Craft Knife or equivalent WITH LONG POINTED BLADES (NO 11) If using a scalpel, please bring small pair of pliers to change blades.
- Spare sharp blades (no 11 pointed) YOU WILL NEED spare blades
- Tracing paper, 2H pencils
- Thin card cereal packet thickness is excellent!
- Masking tape, ruler, scissors, rubber
- Pritt Stick
- Selection of good quality watercolours pans or tubes (not gouache)
- Good quality pointed brush
- Coloured pencils (ideally water soluble, but not essential)
- Vital: BFK Rives (perfect for embossing) 250gsm or 300gsm
- Small selection of Water colour papers, small sizes are OK. Somerset paper also embosses well, but it is NOT friendly to watercolour.
- A small light box IF you have one but a window will work wonders!
- Pastels dry, not oil
- Patience and sense of humour!

Copperplate Weekend with Eleanor Winters

For students with some familiarity with Copperplate letterforms and the pointed pen, this workshop provides some answers to the question, "What next?".

The class will include a brief but intensive review of the basics, with an emphasis on improving skills such as consistency in shape and weight of the letters, as well as spacing. This will be followed by letter variations (both minuscules and capitals), as well as an introduction to Copperplate flourishing. Jenny kissed me when we mit?

MATERIALS TO BRING

- Copperplate penholder
- Nikko G or Tachikawa G nibs (or your preferred CP nibs)
- Non-waterproof black ink, such as Higgins Eternal
- Layout paper, i.e., any calligraphy practice paper through which you can see guide lines
- Water container & cloth or paper towels
- Tracing paper (a few sheets)
- Masking tape
- Ruler
- Pencils (H, HB, or the equivalent)
- Eraser
- Pencil sharpener
- Guide lines, if you have any

Workshop Review

May 2018

Its A Kind of Magic

with **Tina Warren**Lavinia Norfolk Centre
Angmering

This workshop with Tina Warren covered some techniques for providing the calligrapher with useful backgrounds to write upon: suminagashi, patterns using shaving foam and the possibilities of using

bleach on black paper.

Tina presented all students with a sample pack of Saunders watercolour paper, with our names attractively written on the front and two name samplers which we used with the bleach technique.

I think it is fair to say that trying the suminagashi technique had varied results, some managed to produce nicely patterned papers whilst others struggled - sadly no common denominator for success or failure could be found. Something to be experimented on at home, perhaps?

The shaving foam technique did seem a little bizarre but again some students did produce an interesting background and

it can provide a background that is good to write on.

The bleach - applied with either a brush or spray - on the pieces provided by Tina was also interesting. The black writing on black

paper was achieved by writing on white paper and then photocopying onto the black paper. The bleaching effect only works if the photocopying process uses toner and the black paper also has to respond to a slightly diluted bleach. Tina used a Strathmore paper.

This was followed by Tina demonstrating three

styles of contemporary calligraphy using various styles of folded pen. Firstly, an italic variant, then gestural lettering and finally freestyle capitals with the added possibility of dropping in coloured ink into letters written with water.

There was an opportunity for students to make their own folded pen (or Cola pen) but most had brought their own or purchased one of the models that Tina had provided.

Tina shared with us some of her own work and some examples of

calligraphers who have provided inspiration for her, eg. Ben Shahn, the Boudens family and Paul Peter Piech. She also found the cyrillic alphabet inspirational.

The day finished with students showing their work and thanking Tina for an enjoyable day.

Personally, I loved both the italic and freestyle capitals and will definitely be using them in my own work.

Workshop Review

June 2018

Writing with Legende/ Numerals and Flourishes

with Nancy Ouchida-Howells

Saturday 16th June 2018

A search for "Legende" on the internet reveals little information other than it is a flowing informal script that has some Chinese and Arabic qualities. Nancy described the script as having been developed from a typeface from the 1930's and made with a horizontal writing movement. The miniscule letters are only 2 pen nibs high making most characters wider than tall, whilst the capitals were tall and flowing. She likened this to a couple skillfully dancing the tango across the floor.

Practice sheets were handed out but we started with some breathing, shoulder and hand exercises to loosen up and relax. Nancy said it was important to feel comfortable, with our desk and chair at the right height in order to keep the hand and arm relaxed. It was also good to have a slightly soft writing surface, such as a leather pad. She instructed us not to sit too long but

to take breaks for a drink, exercise or to peruse the many examples she had brought to demonstrate.

Nancy did not want us just to practise alphabetic letters individually but to write words so that we could get a rhythm from

one character to the next, which was more important than making individual letters all look perfectly the same. Whilst we worked, Nancy came and sat at each table to demonstrate and use our own pens to test and correct. In my own case she adjusted my hand position so I put more weight to the right of the nib to get the correct ink flow.

After lunch we moved on to practising numbers – not just in Legende but in other scripts too. This was useful as many calligraphy work sheets do not show the scripted numbers. Then she showed us some flourishes and gave us the challenge of writing the word "Party" in Legende with the capital "P" and final "y" in balanced

flourishes.

Up until then some of us had been using a C2 Speedball but we were all encouraged to try other pens including automatic and double-line pens. Interestingly, she said, "automatic" pens were invented to overcome the work of having to make solid thicker lines with a pointed pen and then crosshatching. We tried out her own device of a pen which had a handle of bamboo and a "nib" made from a shaped reed used in clarinets and saxophones. It was both strong and flexible and it was also available for purchase as indeed were many other excellent materials.

We felt that it was an interesting and useful day and thanked Nancy for her instruction, hints and encouragement.

July 14th, 2018 Heene Road Community Centre



Some of the buzz words repeated around the room during the day were rhythm and flow, triangles and pushing back as we learnt some new pen manipulations whilst trying to find the liveliness of hand that Gaynor demonstrates in her work so naturally.

Everyone worked hard and there were some wonderful sheets of lettering appearing across the desks. At the end of the day we managed to squeeze a group exercise into proceedings and I must say I enjoyed looking at the variety of scripts that everyone had produced when I unpacked my bags at home.
