


Newsletter July 2023

Workshop

November 2023

Modern Medieval Capitals with Julia Baxter

Saturday November 11th, 10-4pm approx Cost £20 members/£25 non-members This will be a zoom workshop and replaces the one we originally scheduled for November. The workshop will be recorded.

An exploration workshop of the penwritten Gothic capitals, with all their flamboyance and character, which are perfect for modern Gothic.

This workshop focuses on their main elements, including a re-cap on capitals and looking at their lively and expressive possibilities. We shall bring new life to them with aspects from the past but also involving multiple medieval colours with gestural movements, creating a lively abstract design.

Suitable for all levels

Materials

- A3 Layout Pad
- Writing board (slightly larger than A3)
- Masking tape 1"
- Pencil, tee-square and ruler
- Automatic pen size 4* and other large size nibs such as Speedball size C-0 and Automatic size 5
- Ruling Pen (technical or folded)
- An A4 piece of either grey card or mount board (accompanying scalpel and small cutting mat)
- Black gouache paint or black calligraphy ink (whichever you prefer)
- Gouaches in a range of colours that at least include the primaries. Other paint colours such as watercolours, acrylic inks and Bister Inks are optional
- Mixing palettes (ice cube trays are great !)
- A couple of saucers
- Brushes for mixing paint, loading pens and painting (include some small sizes)



- * We will begin with size 4 Automatic and other sizes are introduced later for exploration.


Calligraphy at St Botolphs

Workshop Review

May 2023

Terrific Tunnel Books Workshop with Jan Pickett

Just a glance at the wonderful examples of tunnel books, which Jan had on display, whet our appetites for this workshop. The books, with their 3D effect allowing the viewer or recipient to 'take a peek' inside, looked so creative, intriguing, unique ... and tricky!! How would we get on?

"It will be fine," we were assured, "you just have to be accurate!"

For me it is always a joy to watch and listen to someone who, like Jan, is hugely talented and passionate about their craft. As we gathered around the table to watch and learn, the anticipation mounted.

Having seen the myriad of possibilities for the finished project, we set to work measuring and cutting accurately our five or so pieces of card of identical size, with ever narrowing cut or torn apertures. All the while, thinking of our design and how we might achieve it. Jan was always at hand with a cheery smile, a suggestion and a handy tip.

From time to time, we reconvened for the next stage of instructions and demonstrations. The concertina side pieces with 'lugs' (new word for me!) to slot and glue the 'pages' of the book together were perhaps the most testing of our dexterity and patience!

Not only did we learn the techniques for making tunnel books but a wealth of other skills and ideas: blending watercolour pencils successfully, using pastels to decorate pages, drawing spirals, making rubber stamps and using them to create patterns...

Heads were down and minds were focussed in the afternoon, motivated by the twin desires both to finish the books we had started and to take the opportunity to try out some of the wealth of techniques Jan

had presented to us.

Huge thanks to Jan and to all who organised this, my first ever in-person workshop with Sussex Scribes. It energised and inspired me and, to quote one of the attendees, "I will take away enough ideas to keep me going all year!"


Zoom Workshop with Gaynor Goffe SSA Italics Part 1


We started our new "Specialist Skills Award in Italics" with Gaynor Goffe in June and it promises to be challenging but fascinating. Gaynor's love for italic letters was more than apparent during the first lesson as she seemed able to just write letters all day long, barely pausing for a fresh cup of tea to refuel. She was an inspiration to us all and her quiet passion for the script was easily transmitted across the zoom airways.

The morning session was dominated by an analysis of the script by Bernardo Cataneo, who in 1545 wrote a 20-page copy book for his calligraphy students at the University of Siena. An enlarged image of one of the pages of the Cataneo MS can be found in Stan Knight's, "Historical Scripts". We looked in detail at the individual letters, learning their forms at first by copying and then settling them into our own hand.

In the afternoon, we created the few letters that were missing from the original exemplar, notably the j and the w and then we started to drop the nib sizes down from a Mitchell's 2, heading towards a Mitchell 4. All the while we were reminded to observe the subtle details of the script. We looked at a few awkward letter combinations and Gaynor had a moment (encouraged by us) when she allowed herself to loosen up and flourish a bit which resulted in some particularly flamboyant "g's".

500 years is a long time, but the beauty of this script remains, inviting anyone who notices it to be inspired and to make some time to study it. *Helen*

Workshop Review

Black & White with Mary Noble July 2023

I am a new to Sussex Scribes and, as this was my first workshop, I approached it with a little trepidation. I need not have worried. Broadwater Baptist Church was easy to find with plenty of parking, which was a good start. The venue was comfortable, clean, with good facilities and lighting and the welcome from the organiser, tutor and fellow students was warm and friendly.

The workshop started promptly, and Mary provided an interesting work-pack. We started with large black letters and how minimalist in shape they could be but remain readable. We then investigated skeletal letters focusing on the spaces in between, glimpsing the design possibilities that they held while still being readable.

The next step on our journey was to play at a layout within a frame, imagining blocks of text and how to create pleasingly balanced alternatives. Our work-pack included a pre-prepared sheet of A4, white with bold black brush strokes of varying strength. Our next task was to frame a section of visual interest, to determine the point where the eyes were drawn with a view to adding text and then considering the style and colour of that text.

Before lunch we were required to harness our inner extrovert – experimenting with scripts and weights to convey loud shouty words. We then broke for lunch and

returned to the same exercise but now the objective was to convey quieter whispery words. It was great to just play with the pens and styles that I would not have ventured to try before.

Then came the hard work

– applying this newfound
understanding to a short
phrase of our own choosing,
experimenting with weight and



contrast of black and white inks and paper to make sure that the result was a piece of well-balanced art with an unambiguous message. Not as easy as it seemed!

The time passed far too quickly, and this was due to Mary's interesting, thought provoking and encouraging tutelage together with a friendly set of attendees happy to review our work throughout the day, offering constructive feedback all the way.

Mary also gave us plenty of tips on how to use the paints, inks and paper so I learned much and would not hesitate to recommend this workshop to anyone who is not sure whether to give it a try or not. Jill Collyer






I recently travelled to Aylesford Priory in Kent for a residential weekend course taught by Toni Watts on the topic of "Gold Borders". The surroundings were inspiring, the company and tuition were fabulous, the bedrooms a little basic (no en-suites but loo and shower down the hall) and a good time had by all.

Toni is a fun and generous teacher, who explained much about the intricacies of adding bling to our work. We learned about gesso, miniatum and gum ammoniac, powdered, shell, loose leaf and transfer gold, yellow, white, green and rose gold, schlag and other lovely shiny stuff!

We spent much of the first day on trials, and design, then the second day on executing one or more pieces of work with borders and/or motifs using gold in some way or another.

For my piece I decided to use gesso for my capital letter, miniatum for the gold lettering, and gum ammoniac for the border sections, and I am rather pleased with the way it worked out. I'll add a mount and submit it for our Arundel exhibition in August. *Mariette*



A new book by Benjamin Myers is a modern retelling of the story of St Cuthbert.

In the first part of the book, Myers uses poetry, prose and quotes from historians to give us a sense of what happened to the body of St Cuthbert and the monks who carried him on the journey from Holy Island to Durham Cathedral.

The author also creates the voice of the saint speaking from beyond the grave. Here, St Cuthbert describes something of what he loved about the rocky outcrop he lived on close to the main island of Lindisfarne:

"At the highest point of this half-acre plot there grows a scant patch of grass and clover so green in the ocean I call it Paradise."

I found some of the writing to be exceptional and the experimental format is both challenging and stimulating.

The second part of the book seems to centre on Durham Cathedral so I am going to save that for a future trip to the city.

This is a great read for anyone who loves reading about early history and St Cuthbert. It is a pretty thick book so would keep you going through a long holiday. *Helen*


